
I urge the board to support this activity.


Report of June 5th Board Meeting at the DAC by Bill Beeson
















The I-Pace, Jaguar's electric vehicle, is coming this year!

The I-Pace is scheduled to be for sale in the U.S. later this year. Initial reviews by the motoring press has been favorable and it will be interesting to see how it is received by the Jaguar enthusiast.

Most Jaguar buyers are unfamiliar with EV's (electric vehicles) and will need to learn about new concepts, terms and capabilities. From the outside they are conventional looking automobiles and have that familiar "Jaguar" look.




With the body off as in the photo below things look very different. These are 4 wheel drive vehicles and between each pair of wheels is an electric motor. These motors are cylindrical in shape and are much smaller, lighter and simpler than gasoline engines and provide a very direct and easy to maintain drive train. Each motor can produce about 200 hp so total power available is around 400 hp. And all that power is available from a standing start!

But look at the "floor pan" of the EV. Its a large metal box covering the entire floor area from front motor to the rear motor and extending out to each side of the car.

This box is about 5 inches thick and holds the batteries used to power the car. It's the fuel tank of the car!

This battery pack consists of hundreds of lithium-ion individual cells wired together producing nearly volts; it weighs 1,300 lbs. Their total capacity is listed at 90 *kWh. This size is a very important aspect of the



vehicle. A higher capacity battery, i.e., more kWh's, means you can drive further between recharging which eases the dreaded "range anxiety". But the battery is one of the major costs of the car and it is also very heavy. So every EV strikes a unique balance between capacity, vehicle range, battery weight and battery costs. Did Jaguar get the right combination? Time will tell.

Meeting was adjourned 8:12pm and most went out to the parking lot to see Erics XK8.





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
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EV Basics - the "kilo - watt - hour", kWh by Gordon Kenney

The introduction of electric vehicles "EV" has also introduced some terms that consumers need to understand. One of the more important is battery "size" which is measured by capacity to store electric energy in units of "kilo-watt-hours" or "kWh". Most everyone is familiar with the unit "watt" as used in a 100 watt light bulb. Powering 10 such bulbs simultaneously would be using electricity at a rate of 1,000 watts (100 x 10) and would be referred to one "kilowatt" (kilo being the prefix indication 1000). One kW (kilo-watt) of electrical power used for one hour represent one kWh of energy used. The kW (kilo-watt) is the "rate" of energy produced or used; kWh (kilo-watt-hour) is the total "quantity" of electric energy produced or used.



The kWh is used to measure the electrical power we purchase from our local electric utility (Xcel, IREA, etc.) and we usually pay from 10 to 20 cents per kWh used. A typical residence will use between 600 and 1200 kWh per month costing from \$60 to \$150. Air conditioning, baking and clothes drying are some of the activities using high rates of electric energy.

Electric cars usually can travel from 2 to 4 miles on one KWh depending on vehicle size and weight and on the speed traveled, with highway speeds taking considerably more energy than in-town driving. An EV with a 50 kW-hr battery may have a useful "range" of 100 to 200 miles.

EV (electric vehicles) that are pure "electric" (Tesla, Nisson Leaf, Chevrolet BOLT and Jaguar I-Pace) will have battery capacities ranging from 60 to 120 kWh capacity. Those EV's that are labeled "extended range" EVs, will have batteries in the 10 to 30 kWh range and after this energy is used a gasoline-powered generator will start to provide more electricity to extend the vehicles range. A "hybrid" car that is not built to "plug-in" may have 2 kWh or less of battery capacity.

Some EV manufacturers offer larger capacity battery packs as an extra cost option (Nisson Leaf and Tesla). More capacity gives longer range but weighs more, cost more and take longer to recharge.

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Minutes of Meeting, 6 June 2018 The meeting was held at the Havana Exchange former Car Quest building, 2982 S.Havana in Aurora..

Legislative: Leo Boyle was unable to attend. SEMA reported that the Colorado bill that would have extended the new car emission exemption in Colorado did not make it out of committee. SEMA is also requesting car enthusiasts to contact federal legislators to support House Resolution 5858 which would expand pump warning labels on gasoline pumps dispensing E15 gas (15% ethanol).

Swap Meet & Car Show: August 4th. The contract with Rocky Mountain Metro Airport has been signed for CCCC to be the Car Show (and Swap Meet) contractor. CCCC is to provide 100 volunteers to handle parking for spectators and we need people to sign up to assist. There will be a parking charge of \$5 per car for spectators and CCCC will receive 20% of that revenue. The revised budget for the event was presented and discussed. It was moved, seconded, and approved unanimously. (Copies of the budget can be obtained by contacting the secretary). There will be a very tight schedule for cars to enter the CCCC car show and swap area so as not to interfere with the air shows. Specifically, swap vendors should be in by 7 AM; car show entrants move in between 7 am and 8:30 am (none after 8:30). Spectators will start moving in by 6:30 am. Details are to be provided at the July CCCC meeting.

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
